Meeting Minutes for October 3, 2012, 1-4pm

Wendy and Beverley reported that, at the Youth Integration meeting held earlier this morning, Mike had suggested the possibility of covering all sectors and selecting a child, youth and family red flag.

The committee agreed that if the data tells us where the focus is, we should address it as such, regardless of whether or not it allows for one red flag in each of the categories of child, youth and family.

The first official meeting of the restructured Network is scheduled for November 22nd. The committee discussed how they will put forward recommendations to the Network who, in turn, will be responsible for the actual work to "turn the curve" on the red flags. The possibility of a working group(s) was discussed.

Beverley Bell-Rowbotham presented the Hastings & Prince Edward report card considerations, which included population descriptors. Beverley expressed concern about the availability of census data on income. It is possible we will not have updated, valid income data.

Flags to be brought forward to the Core on November 22, 2012:

	1. Teen births/pregnancies
	2. Smoking (women/teens)
	3. Rate of children in care (parenting programs, Babies & Beyond, FET, Triple P, Early Years, etc.)
	4. Children's readiness to learn (EDI/EQAO)
	5. Teens accessing services (transitions, clinical services, unemployment, counseling, ER visits/crisis line, mental health hospitalization – youth, children, adults, high school graduation rates)
	6. Bullying/Safe Schools (Threat Assessment Protocol/Safe Schools)
	7. Food Security
	8. High percentage of people have Medical doctor
	9. High percentage of people have sense of community belonging

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Discussion:

- The committee discussed the effect of personal choice on each of the red flags.
- The committee discussed their desire to address poverty but without good data, we cannot do it at this point. However, the above red flags will still address poverty on some level.
- Top three areas of vulnerability for Kindergarten children across Hastings/Prince Edward are: gross and fine motor skills; communication skills and general knowledge; pro-social and helping behaviours.
- The committee discussed the possibility of creating a report card with an updated status report a year later.
- The committee was advised that the EDI is a community measure, not an educational measure. The EDI measures how well the community prepares the children for school. The data is released at a community level not a school level. Also, the EDI is performed by Kindergarten teachers every three years, and not annually.
- The committee discussed that there are many perceived gaps that are not really gaps.

Beverley will speak with Lily Lee to get more information about her study on transitions.

Presentation to Network:

- Include: What does this measure? How are we doing? etc.
- Helpful to have real numbers in the report in addition to statistics to help people identify
- Substitute "regional" language with "Hastings/Prince Edward"
